Overview

Christian Brothers Academy was founded in 1900 as a Catholic college preparatory school for boys in the Syracuse area. Chartered by the New York State Board of Regents, the school is a member of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the Christian Brothers' Educational Association and the National Secondary School Principals' Association. Although operating under Roman Catholic auspices, qualified students of all faiths are eligible for admission. In 1977 a Junior High Program was instituted for grades 7 and 8. In 1987 the school's Board of Trustees voted to admit female students.

Syracuse is a middle-income urban community of diversified industries with a population of approximately 750,000 in the regional area served by this school.

Ratio: The ratio of students at CBA is approximately 60 percent boys and 40 percent girls.

Calendar

The school year is divided into six marking periods of approximately six weeks in length. The year is divided into two semesters. The school day is divided into 8 instructional periods of 40 minutes each. We operate on a six day rotating schedule and all major subjects (English, Social Studies, Math, Science and Foreign Language) meet every day. Students take Midterm and Final Exams at the end of each semester. (Seniors with an 85 average in a subject are exempt from the final in the second semester.) Except for seniors, the Regents exam is the Final Exam in the Regents courses.

High School Curriculum

AP Courses Offered: Biology, Chemistry, Calculus AB, Statistics, Spanish, U.S. History, European History, English Literature, English Language, Studio Art, French, Physics and U.S. Government & Politics.

Honors Courses Offered: Honors courses are available in most major subjects.

Students are placed in AP and Honors courses based on their performance in the previous course, teacher recommendation, motivation, and ability.

Grading, Grade Point & Class Rank

Semester averages are determined by adding the three Marking Period grades for that particular Semester to the Semester Exam grade and dividing by 4. Final Averages for the year are the average of the two Semesters.

I. Honors are based on semester averages:

- **High Honors** - 93 average with no grade lower than 85
- **Honors** - 90 average with no grade lower than 80

Semester averages are weighted, based on the degree of difficulty of each course. Honors distinction will be based on a weighted average. Overall GPA reflects weighting, not individual marking period grades.

- **A.P. (Advanced Placement)** courses are multiplied by 1.05.
- **H (Honors)** courses are multiplied by 1.03.
- **R (Regents)** courses are multiplied by 1.00.

Half unit courses do not receive the same weight in determining average. These include Computer, Writing, some Art and Music courses, Health, Band, Chorus and Physical Education. They are divided by 2 in the calculation of the average. Christian Service is not included in the average.

II. Rank

CBA does not rank its students. We believe that the minute fractional differences between positions of rank do not significantly distinguish one CBA student from another. We are convinced that the concept of rank does not accurately reflect the selective nature of our student body or our rigorous college preparatory curriculum and individual achievement. We feel rank could be misleading as an indication of a student's true academic quality and ability to perform successfully in college.

III. Grade Point Average

The semester average is out of 100 points. A cumulative GPA will be calculated at the end of each academic year.
