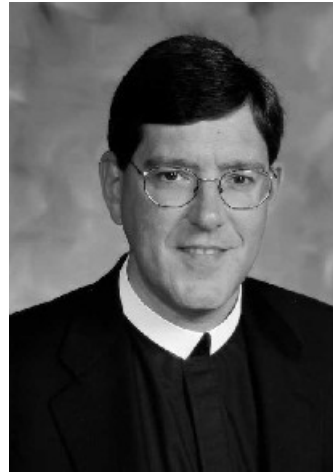

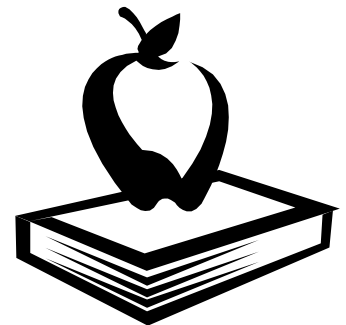
June 2003 Regents Exams as well as the Advanced Placement results are very encouraging. Parents, students, faculty, and staff should be quite proud of these significant accomplishments.

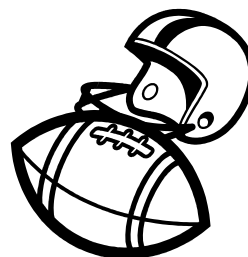
Varsity Sports

Costa Rica Trip with Mr. Duda

There are two proposed dates for the Costa Rica trip: February and Spring break. Traveling in Costa Rica's cities and rainforest will expose students to diverse knowledge about many topics. They can compare government regulations, gain some perspective of how ecosystems impact economies and learn about social interactions and how human and natural events impact the rainforests.

The cost of the trip will be approximately \$2,000 for the 8-10 days, which includes hotel, airfare, and meals. Students will need a passport (applications are available at the Post Office).

We will visit and explore the cities of San Jose, Tortuguero, Montverde, and Santa

Elena. Trip highlights include: hiking in national parks, touring an active volcano w/adjacent hot springs, boat ride/hiking in the rainforest, visit of coastal beaches (swim, surf, fish, dive, etc.), and there is an optional canopy tour that uses zip lines and foot bridges. Juniors Prepare for PSAT and College

The PSAT is the Preliminary Scholastic Assessment Test. All juniors will take this test the morning of October 21st. The test will last 3 hours. It is the practice test for the SAT I (Scholastic Aptitude Test). It is also the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. Students should check the calendar outside the guidance office for a schedule of visiting college representatives. Students must request a pass from the guidance office at least one day ahead of the scheduled visit and permission from their teacher to leave class. If a student cannot meet with a college rep on the day of the visit, it is important to advise the guidance office in advance so that an information packet can be sent to the student.

Congratulations to seniors (and twins) Brandon and Justin Noia, who both earned perfect 800 SAT II writing scores on their June tests!

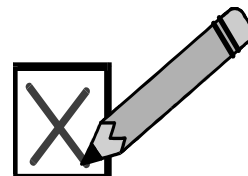
Sophomores Take the PLAN Test

The PLAN test is the practice exam for the ACT (American College Test) taken in the spring of junior year. The exam consists of an interest inventory and academic tests in the areas of Math, English, Reading, and Science Reasoning. The PLAN provides each student with an estimated composite score that is used as a predictor for the ACT. The test will be given the morning of October 21st and will last approximately 3 hours.

Students will be receiving practice questions and a PLAN guidebook from their guidance counselor by early October.

Fall Testing Day for Grades 8, 10, and 11

October 21st will be testing day at CBA. Students will be dismissed at noon. Grades 8-11 will be taking standardized exams, while the 7th graders will be going on a field trip to Albany. All students taking a standardized exam will receive instructions and practice questions from their guidance counselors well in advance of the exam date. Grades 8 and 10 will be taking ACT exams, the EXPLORE and PLAN, and the juniors will be taking the PSAT. Students will be bringing home booklets that answer frequently asked questions about each test.

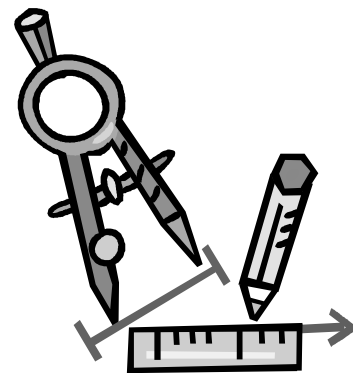

CBA DRESS CODE: PLEASE POST!

Appropriate and neat attire is expected at CBA. Unacceptable attire and grooming reflect a poor image of the student as well as the school. Dressing in a neat and professional manner is a sign to yourself and others that CBA is a place where seriousness of purpose can be found.

Oxford Shirts

- White or light blue **oxford style with collar**
- CBA monogram (Purple)
- Generous fit
- Any sleeve length
- Tucked in – long enough to stay in with no visible underclothing
- **Girls only:** Only the top button may be undone; no visible undershirts
- **Boys only:** Buttoned and worn with a tie

Golf Shirts

Sept. – Oct. 17 (end of MP 1)

April 19– June 8

- White, light blue, navy blue, yellow, or CBA purple
- CBA insignia or monogram
- Short golf sleeve (no cap sleeves)
- Generous fit
- Tucked in – long enough to stay in with no visible underclothing

Pants

- Docker style dress pants worn appropriately; tight pants are not acceptable
- Khaki, charcoal, or navy blue
- No low riders, Capri pants, or Cargo pants
- No rivets or frayed edges
- No velour or denim

Skirts

(Girls only)

- Knee length or longer (no slits above the knee)
- Khaki, charcoal, or navy blue
- No velour, denim, frayed edges

Sweaters

- Crew, cardigan, v-neck, or vest style sweaters permitted
- Solid color – any color permitted
- No writing, stripes, or patterns
- Dress code style shirt must be worn under all sweaters (logo is not necessary under sweaters)
- No turtleneck sweaters or mock turtlenecks
- No fleece or sweatshirts

Shoes

- Dress style shoes; solid color (no stripes or decals)
- No open toe shoes
- Maximum heel height approximately 2"
- Boots permitted only from December 1 – April 1

Hair

- Must be a natural color
- Neat, clean, and acceptably styled (not covering the eyes)
- **Hair must be appropriately styled. Boys must be clean-shaven and hair must be above the collar and ears. Boys may not have braids or cornrows.**

CBA DRESS DOWN GUIDELINES

Shirts

- Polo shirts or loose fitting T-shirts are permitted
- **NO** tank tops, spaghetti straps, tube tops, tight stretch material, short shirts, or bare midriffs
- **NO** visible underclothing
- **NO** inappropriate words or pictures (i.e. portraying alcohol, drugs, violence, etc.)

Pants

- **For Boys:** Any style jeans, pants, or long shorts (**to the knee**) are permitted
- **For Girls:** Any style jeans, pants, long shorts (**to the knee**) or Capri pants are permitted

Shoes

- Sneakers are permitted

Miscellaneous

- Hats and sunglasses are **not** permitted
- Visible body piercings, markings, and tattoos are not permitted.
- Any student who is out of dress code will not be allowed to attend classes.

The Assistant Principals make the final decisions regarding student grooming and appearance.

Build a Strong Parent-Guidance Office Connection

A special message to parents from the Guidance Office

The counselors at CBA are people who listen to student problems, whether large or small. They care about the students and what they are thinking and feeling. As counselors, they're available to help students with issues involving friends, teachers, academics, drug and alcohol issues, or any other concern that might arise at school. Above all, the guidance office offers students support through difficult situations to help ensure their time at CBA is fulfilling and successful.

Parents have a special responsibility in ensuring the success of our students as well. As such, parents are our students primary prevention educators. Here we offer "A twelve-Step Approach to Prevention," which was designed to prepare parents to take on the challenges of raising drug-free children:

1. Be a good role model.
2. Listen to your children.
3. Talk to your children about alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs.
4. Encourage your children to engage in healthy, creative activities.
5. Ask questions about your children's friends and activities.
6. Call on other parents for support.
7. Help your children feel good about themselves.
8. Help your children develop strong values.
9. Establish family rules about alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use.
10. Help your children deal with peer pressure.
11. Know what to do if you suspect a problem.
12. Carry this message to other parents.

As parents, you may find it difficult to spot signs of alcohol and drug use. While mood swings and unpredictable behavior are frequent occurrences for preteens and teenagers, there are certain signs—which apply equally to our sons and daughters—that parents should be aware of. If your child exhibits one or more of these behaviors, drug use may be at the heart of the problem:

- Student is withdrawn, depressed, tired, and careless about personal grooming.
- Student is hostile and uncooperative; may frequently break curfews.
- Student's relationships with family members have deteriorated.
- Student is hanging around with a new group of friends.
- Student's grades have slipped and school attendance is irregular.
- Student has lost interest in hobbies, sports, or other favorite activities.
- Student's eating and/or sleeping habits have changed.
- Student has a hard time concentrating.
- Student's eyes are red-rimmed and nose is runny in the absence of a cold.
- Household money has been disappearing.

Lasallian Summer Assembly

Students from ten Christian Brothers schools in the eastern United States, including CBA, attended a youth assembly in July at Keystone College in Pennsylvania. 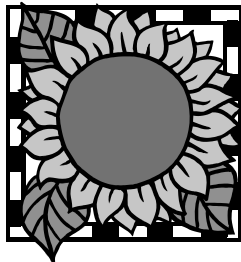
